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There are currently no specific OSHA standards for dentistry. However, exposure to numerous biological, chemical, environmental, physical, and psychological workplace hazards that may apply to dentistry are addressed in specific OSHA standards for general industry.

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Dentistry - Overview | Occupational Safety and Health

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Bloodborne Pathogens Standard. (29 CFR 1910.1030)
This is the most frequently requested and referenced OSHA standard affecting medical and dental offices. Some basic requirements of the OSHA Bloodborne Pathogens standard include: A written exposure control plan, to be updated annually. Use of universal precautions.

Dentists and team members are required to comply with all aspects of OSHA's respiratory protection program. including the initial and annual fit test, when the hazard assessment determines that the use of an N95 is required. A seal check must be performed every time an N95 mask is used.

Ideally, dental treatment should be provided in individual patient rooms, whenever possible. For dental facilities with open floor plans, to prevent the spread of pathogens there should be: At least 6 feet of space between patient chairs. Physical barriers between patient chairs.

Compliance with the additional legislation specific to the dental workplace is also required by the General Dental Council, under its Standards for Dental Professionals documentation. To comply with the basic requirements of the Health and Safety at Work Act, every employer in the dental workplace must abide by the following requirements.

The CDC's Guidelines for Infection Control in Dental Health-Care Settings-2003 recommends the following: 1) Wear a surgical mask and eye protection with solid side shields or a face shield to protect mucous membranes of the eyes, nose, and mouth during procedures likely to generate splashing or spattering of blood or other body fluids; 2) Change masks between patients, or during patient treatment if the

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mask becomes wet.

OSHA Regulations OSHA (The Occupational Safety and Health Administration) mandates that all dental offices have an infection control training manual available for training new employees as well as for implementing and maintaining OSHA standards. This manual must be updated on an annual basis.

As a part of the US Department of Labor, the OSHA directives are law, which require employers to provide their employees with working conditions that are free of known dangers and hazards. So, the short answer is, yes – training is mandated and a requirement under OSHA, set by the US Department of Labor, thus federal law.

OSHA Training Requirements for Dental Healthcare Providers ...

According to OSHA, the most critical documents that a dental practice must have in place are safety plans for exposure control (infection prevention and control), hazard communication (chemical safety), and general workplace safety (includes identification of trip and fall hazards, safe operation of equipment, and prevention of workplace violence).

The guidelines have also been reorganized into two sections: recommended infection prevention and control practices for routine dental healthcare delivery, and recommended practices when providing dental healthcare for a patient with suspected or confirmed SARS-CoV-2 infection.

On Friday, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) issued a new guidance for dentistry workers and employers related to the COVID-19 pandemic. ¹ The dental guidance falls under OSHA's general interim guidance, which requires employers to provide their employees safety from SARS-CoV-2, the virus strain that causes COVID-19.
